Personality – Barbara Spencer A Blooming Good Life

As a useful reference for this profile, Barbara offered a book she had put together for her family using a list of all the houses she has lived in as its framework - involving a daunting twenty moves. A picture emerges of an adventurous family, always ready for a new challenge and not afraid of a bit of hard work!

Barbara was born in Creswick in 1942. Her parents, Allan and Jean (Boustead) Yates, lived on a farm at *Fair View* Newlyn North. They were third generation farmers in the Newlyn district. Both Barbara's great grandfathers were Newlyn farmers in the 1880s. Allan sold the property in 1976.

Barbara attended Mount Prospect and Newlyn State Schools, before moving on to Queen's Church of England Girls' Grammar School as a weekly boarder. 'My memories of my childhood home are happy ones. It was a ritual from the time I left to go to boarding school that when I returned home, on weekends Mum and I would walk around Fair View's garden together. It was here that I learnt to love gardens, learnt plant names and general gardening skills - a mutual interest we shared for the rest of Mum's life.' After completing her final year at Queen's in 1959, Barbara enrolled in a Diploma Course in Medical Laboratory Technology, working at the Ballarat Base Hospital in conjunction with studies at the Ballarat School of Mines. Late in 1962, Barbara moved to Melbourne where she worked in Pathology at the

She first met Ray Spencer in 1961 when he was a student at the Victorian School of Forestry in Creswick. They married in 1966 and their first home together was a small house they rented in Parkville. Barbara remembers a small back garden. 'Ray built window boxes for me to plant daffodils, which were a great success.'

Royal Children's Hospital while continuing her

studies at the Royal Melbourne Institute of

In 1965, Ray returned to tertiary study, ultimately completing his Doctor's degree in Forest Science. A new role for Barbara emerged as Ray worked on his thesis. It was large and had to be typed up, so they invested in a typewriter and Barbara learned how to use it. 'This was the beginning of my long involvement in typing his several theses, many published papers, and innumerable reports.'

Her interest in computers was to grow, and largely self-taught, she developed an impressive grasp of this evolving technology and was able to provide invaluable assistance to Ray throughout his career.

Their first son, Allan, was born in 1968, prompting them to search for a home of their own which they found in Middle Park. Ray and Barbara threw themselves into renovations, inside and out. Second son Douglas was born in 1972, followed by Lachlan in 1973.

The family was to move many times as Ray's career unfolded. Typically, they chose homes like their first basically sound, in need of some work, space for the boys and always, with garden potential. Then the work would begin, with the boys involved and other family members also lending a hand. A vegetable garden was always given high priority. Resourceful and adaptable, Barbara took work where and when she could as she juggled work and family responsibilities, especially when the children were small.

Another aspect of Ray's career was that he was often required to travel and work away from home, including within Australia, also in Canada and the USA; sometimes for extended periods. Several renovation projects were interrupted when they decided that the family would take the opportunity to accompany him. Ray would usually leave first to begin work and find accommodation. Barbara and the boys would pack everything up and, if necessary, arrange for their house to be rented.

The first of these family adventures began when Ray was awarded a scholarship to study at Reading University in England. The new house, *Silbury*, turned out to be one of Barbara's favourites. 'I particularly enjoyed the English seasons in the garden - snow in winter and bulbs in spring in fact all the English plants I was familiar with ... Our other home in England was a Westfalia VW camper van that we used for many sorties into the English countryside. It was a tight squeeze but lots of fun.'

During another such trip to Perth in 1989, Barbara was offered work as secretary to the Dean of Agriculture. 'This was a new experience for me but as I was familiar with the University environment I managed not to disgrace myself. I even mastered the use of a personal computer rather than a Macintosh, which I had been used to.'

In 1983, Ray took up a new role lecturing at Melbourne University's new Forestry Campus at Creswick. They found a house in Burnbank Street, Ballarat - a large, heritage-listed Victorian house on a very large block and ready for extensive renovation.

Barbara returned to the Pathology Department at Ballarat Base Hospital after an absence of 21 years.

During this time, the boys were involved in the music program at Ballarat High School. A Music Support Group of interested parents was formed to raise funds and Barbara was elected President. 'With our garden starting to take shape, I suggested that we hold a Garden Party at our house and invite the School's Bands and other musical groups to perform for parents and friends.' The Garden Party was a great success and became a popular fixture for seven years - a lot of work but 'always worth it on the day.'

On the morning of the last garden party in 1994, Ray arrived home from Creswick to whisk Barbara away to see 'this most amazing house' in Alcorns Road on the north side of Springhill. 'We both knew we had to move there - completed house, blank canvas for a hillside garden, and the views. Wow! We were up for our next challenge.' The name chosen for the new property was Snow Gum Springs. They installed rabbit-proof fencing, planted casuarinas and red gums along the driveway. They made terraces, built retaining walls, installed a watering system, then planted shelter belts and gardens - 'the fun part'.

In 1997, Ray resigned from the University and took a position as a Principal Research Scientist with the Bureau of Rural Sciences in Canberra. Barbara enjoyed the proximity to art galleries, museums and the theatre. Sydney and the coast were accessible and there were parts of NSW they hadn't seen before to explore. Barbara found work with Capital Pathology and is proud of the work she did there, especially 'the challenge of getting the laboratory's documentation up to date for an upcoming accreditation.'

In 2002, it was time to return to Victoria and *Snow Gum Springs*. The trees they had planted had grown substantially, now they could restore and extend the garden. Ray built sheds for chooks and storage, a pergola, while Barbara planted fruit and nut trees, berries and olives. Together they planted over 4,000 trees and shrubs, creating a haven for birds.

In 2015, they decided it was time to downsize. *Snow Gum Springs* was sold and they moved into their current home in Creswick and set about creating *another* new garden.

For several years, Barbara and Ray have opened their garden for the *Garden Lovers Weekend*. Visitors have been delighted by Barbara's beautifully imagined flower gardens and Ray's vegetable beds and fanciful follies.

What a trail of gardens they have left behind them ... from their first home, when Ray built window boxes in which Barbara grew daffodils ...

Creswick-Smeaton RSL - ANZAC Day

ANZAC Day started as usual with the Dawn Service. There was a good attendance by the community and following the Service all were invited to the Gunfire Breakfast at the Senior Citizens Centre. This was served by Ed Koene and his team. During the breakfast, a special presentation of the RSL Appreciation Shield was made to Terry Hope for his continuing photographic support to the RSL since 1993, providing a pictorial history of the Dawn Service, ANZAC March, ANZAC Service Remembrance Services. Also, since 2012 when the RSL set up its website, Terry provided these photos as a pictorial history of what the RSL does and the community that supports it. RSL conducted a service at the Soldiers Graves at the Cemetery and the Memorial Stones in front of the RSL Hall.

A large crowd gathered for the March. The scouts acted as flag bearers, with the band, school groups and other organisations taking part.

At the ANZAC Service, as is tradition, a name from the cenotaph is remembered and this year it was Reginald Lindsay. A special presentation was read during the service, as this was to commemorate the 60th Anniversary of the Field of Crosses started by Arthur Bellingham in 1964 with the first display on 25 April 1965. Arthur looked after the crosses for 43 years until his passing in 2007. Stan Hepper took over until ill health caused him to retire in 2012, with Phil Greenbank assuming the mantle from him. A pictorial display of the history of the layout and locations of the Field of Crosses, up to todays present site is located at the end of the Memorial Gardens. A static

display has been set up at the RSL Hall with Arthur's original notebook. *This Place*, was played with permission from Mike Brady. This song references remembering a loved one, those who served and those who did not come home.

With support from the Community Bank Creswick & District and the Creswick Railway Workshop Association, RSL was able to purchase a new PA system for use on the day.

Following the service, the community was invited back to the RSL for light refreshments. Due to the adverse weather the annual game of 2Up was conducted indoors.

The RSL would like to thank the community for their generous support to the ANZAC Appeal raising just over \$8,000 for the Veterans Welfare Fund. Also, thanks go to the Creswick Brass Band and bugler Craig Latrobe; Ed Koene and team; Creswick Scouts; Senior Citizens for their hall; Creswick Red Cross for serving the afternoon refreshments; Creswick Police; Hepburn Shire and gardeners; RACV Goldfields Resort for the golf cart and CFA member Damian Knowles as the driver; Creswick, Creswick North, St Augustine's, Newlyn and Mt Blowhard Primary Schools for the poetry readings and finally to the Creswick and district community for their ongoing support of the RSL.

Park Lake's Membership Continues to Grow

The work carried out by Friends of Park Lake (FOPL) continues to attract a growing number of people who are eager to join this committed group of enthusiastic gardeners and historians.

Park Lake, once the social heart of Creswick, fell into neglect in the 1930s but a dedicated group of interested locals banded together in the 1990s to restore the area into the vibrant nature reserve it once was.

Since March nine new volunteers have signed up and are already being put to work watering, collecting and moving rocks and new planting around the pond. At its last meeting Vice President, Yvette Dare, presented original garden plans which included paths and walk ways around the pond. The paths are in desperate need of repair and it is hoped that funding and sponsorship will become available to rectify the degradation.

Hepburn Shire Council continues to provide muchappreciated support and is working with the Friends on maintenance at the park, including a new picnic area with tables and benches.

To encourage biodiversity, the Friends are working closely with the local Landcare Group on the last remaining remnant of native vegetation in the park.

Regularly the Friends are invited to attend the Welcome to New Residents meeting, to promote Friends of Park Lake, its aims and benefits and to encourage new residents to consider joining this growing group of enthusiasts.

A date to remember: FOPL's major fundraising event is the Winter Solstice Festival to be held on Saturday 21 June from 1.00pm – 11.00 pm at Park Lake.

At the recent ANZAC Day Service, FOPL was represented by Leo, Nora, Fletcher and Lainey, assisted by Maria Marco in laying a wreath.

Park Lake Renovation

A work in progress is often not a pretty sight. The renovation of Park Lake Reserve's Lake is a work in progress and it is certainly not a pretty sight at present. However few would suggest it has been a pretty sight in recent years in its silted up and derelict condition. Having now been cleared of the silt and rubbish accumulated in it over the past 100 years and more, and deepened to increase its storage capacity, it will not be long before it again becomes a show piece for our town.

The clearing operation proved to be of great interest to townspeople and passers by alike, with a constant stream of visitors stopping in to wonder how deep the work would go, how the trucks will get through the mud, will the excavator get bogged, and what treasures will be found. Several gold fossickers found the lake bottom to be of interest and visitors who walked the path on the north side of the lake were intrigued to see timbered mine workings uncovered below the old lake bed.

Material removed from the lake bed has been moved to the eastern end of the reserve and will be used when it dries out to fill a former borrow pit and areas from which surface gravel had been stripped many years ago. The haul road formed and used to move this material will be developed now as one of the walking tracks proposed in the Park Lake Master Plan, and adjoining areas will be planted as proposed in that plan as the necessary funds become available.

Further work is still to be undertaken around the Lake itself and this will proceed in the months ahead.

To those who have been working for the improvement of Park Lake Reserve through the past few years it is hardly believable that the lake has now been cleared. They are, and our whole community should be, grateful for the effort made by Council officers to secure the funding and approvals needed for the work to be undertaken, and by contractors and Council employees to carry out the work under the conditions they encountered.



What To Do in the First 72 Hours After an Emergency

As part of the Hepburn Shire Council's ongoing community resilience initiatives, a number of locals, including members of the Creswick Readiness Group, recently gathered to learn about the importance of the *first 72 hours following an emergency*, such as bushfires, floods, or major storms.

Here are a few essential steps to keep in mind:

- **Stay Informed**: tune into ABC local radio, check *VicEmergency* app updates and follow advice from emergency services.
- Check on Others: reach out to neighbours, particularly those who are elderly, isolated or have mobility challenges.
- Avoid Dangerous Areas: steer clear of damaged roads, fallen trees, and downed powerlines until authorities declare them safe.
- **Document Damage**: take photos of any damage to your property for insurance purposes and keep receipts for essential expenses.

Look After Your Mental Health: emotional recovery takes time. Don't hesitate to talk to someone you trust or seek professional help. Resources are available through local health services and council support lines.

Preparing for both the emotional and practical aftermath of emergencies is just as important as physical preparedness. MHFA training is a powerful tool in strengthening community support and resilience – another reason to consider signing up this May.

Let's build a safer, more connected Creswick – one conversation at a time.

May 5, 1925 The half yearly spelling bee in connection with the Creswick branch A.N.A., was held last Wednesday evening, and proved the most successful one since it was introduced. There was a large attendance of both competitors and their friends, fifty eight taking part.

May 8, 1925 Established 1866 – H. M. Trezise, General storekeeper, High Street, Kingston.

May 12, 1925 The Creswick Golf Club's links at North Creswick will be opened next Saturday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, when the actual play for this season will commence. Sir Alexander Peacock has kindly accepted an invitation to declare the links open.

May 15, 1925 Rocky Lead School Competition – A concert and dance will be held in the Rocky Lead hall on Wednesday 20th isn't. Lady Peacock will crown the successful queen. Admission: Concert 1/-, Dance: Gents, 1/6; Ladies 1/-. C. C. Phillips, Hon. Sec.

May 19, 1925 There should be some good trout fishing in this district in the course of a year or two owing to the action taken by the Borough Council. The Chief Inspector of Fisheries visited the town some

time ago at the request of that body, and after inspection of the waters, agreed to provide 3,000 yearling trout to stock them.

May 22, 1925 Dean. A concert to raise funds to purchase a gramophone for the use of the school was given by the children recently in the local hall. The hall was comfortably filled by an enthusiastic audience, and Mr. B. Kay (Chairman of the committee) presided.

May 26, 1925 Mounted Constable J. C. Montgomery, who has had charge of the Creswick Police Station for some time past, has received notice of his transfer. We understand Mr. Montgomery will be going to the metropolis.

May 29, 1925 Borough of Creswick – Double Pan Service Tenders will be received by the undersigned until 5 p.m. on Tuesday, 14th July, 1925 for –

Providing a Double Pan service for the Borough.

Term to be for five years, from 1st December 1925.

The contract may be renewed for a second term of Five years, should both parties be agreeable. Approximate number of Pans, 400.

Creswick Garden Club Attracting New Members

There's many an avid gardener who has expressed interest and frustration in wanting to come to hear some of the excellent speakers organised by the Creswick Garden Club, but having been unable to attend as meetings are held in the afternoon.

To address this problem the committee introduced an evening meeting. The inaugural night time meeting was a great success with guest speaker Dr Greg Moore OAM, sharing his prodigious knowledge on all things to do with trees.

His entertaining talk had an unsettling message: the world cannot afford to destroy forests at the rate it's doing if humans want to survive. In Australia alone, 97% of requests to remove trees have been approved. In South Australia over the last decade 11% of tree canopies have been lost.

Human beings need trees; we evolved in the presence of trees for both active and passive recreation. Research indicates that trees improve health and well-being and from a study undertaken in 2019 on the effects of trees on women's health, women lived longer, had better learning outcomes and less family and community violence. And if further evidence was needed trees add 30% to the value of properties.

Dr Moore left us with a little mathematical equation – 3:30:300 that should be shared with all urban planners. Three trees within eyesight of a home; 30% canopy cover 300 metres to green space from your home.

Dr Moore's message was both sobering and optimistic. We can all do something positive to protect our environment. And aren't we lucky to live in Creswick, where we are surrounded by trees.

President Pam Lockhart, was delighted with the number of people who came out after dark to listen to such a worthy guest speaker. Let's hope there will be more meetings in the evening.




