Do you have something that is broken or faulty, but is too good to just throw away? Whv not bring it along to see if can brought back to life or repurposed. The café is run by local sustainability group, Transition

Creswick, and supported by the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre. It's all about community, sustainability and making things last.

Repair skills on offer often include sewing, darning, bicycle maintenance, repairs to small electrical items, clocks and computers. One of the most significant advantages of the Repair Café is their contribution to reducing waste. There are three main problems with modern appliances - they are not made to last, they are not possible to repair and replacement parts cannot be easily sourced. With that in mind, the resourceful people at Repair and Share are often forced to magic up some imaginative solutions to difficult problems. At times this involves stripping other devices for usable parts and even going to the length of 3D printing replacement parts that are otherwise unobtainable.

While the service provided is of great value to the community, it in fact costs nothing to have your item repaired. Although customers are invited to make a

and the service is free to all.

The team is willing to have a crack at anything, with the understanding that some things are not practical or possible to fix on the spot. Along with the usual repair and re-purpose activities, there are regular information and **how to** sessions, which are also free to attend. Recent events have included a home preserving session, a 3D printing display and an interactive demonstration covering the safe use of power tools.

But the Repair Café is about more than repairs. It's a place to have a cuppa, meet your neighbours and feel part of something positive. While you're there, grab a bite! By purchasing some of the freshly made cakes, toasties and soups you can help the group fundraise. Repair and Share represents a refreshing shift towards sustainability, skill-sharing and community engagement. In a world increasingly driven by consumerism, it reminds us of the value of community, creativity and repair - proving that sometimes, the best way to move forward is to fix the things we already have!



Council News

Council Plan, Budget and other strategic documents adopted



At the Council Meeting on 24 June 2025, Council formally adopted a suite of key strategic documents that will shape the future of our Shire, including the Council Plan 2025–2029 (incorporating the Municipal Health and Wellbeing Plan), Budget 2025/2026, Financial Plan,

Revenue and Rating Plan, and Asset Plan. These important strategic documents will help guide the future of the Shire.

Council Plan 2025-2029 - sets the strategic direction of Hepburn Shire Council for the Council term. The Plan details the outcomes, strategies and measures Council will focus its efforts and resources on for the four-year Council term to achieve the Community Vision in a financially sustainable way. The Plan was developed with community input via surveys and our Deliberative Engagement Panel as well as Councillor and Officer workshops.

Budget 2025/2026 - focuses on our commitment to core services while making tough yet responsible decisions to protect our short and long-term futures. It sets the framework for Council to deliver what the community needs in a financially responsible way.

Financial Plan - provides a 10-year projection of financial sustainability, detailing how the Council Plan and other integrated plans will be funded to achieve Council's Community Vision 2040. This Plan is crucial for supporting the long-term goals and aspirations of the community and is supported by the Council Plan, budgets, workforce plans and other key strategies and documents, especially the Financial Vision.

Asset Plan - covers the next 10-year period and outlines Council's approach to managing its community assets. Council manages public assets with a total replacement value of just under \$500 million, for the benefit of its community. As our Shire grows and changes, our existing infrastructure ages and requires change.

Revenue and Rating Plan - aims to identify the most suitable revenue and rating strategy for Council (\$43.8 million total revenue 2025/26). This Plan will ensure adequate funding for the priority outcomes outlined in the Council Plan. The Local Government Act 2020 mandates that each council must develop a Revenue and Rating Plan covering at least four years after each council election.

Environmental Effects Statement released

AusNet, the proponent of the Western Renewables Link, has now published its Environmental Effects Statement (EES). Hard copies of the EES documents are currently on display at our Daylesford Library, Clunes Library and Creswick Hub from 30 June to 22 August 2025.

A committee appointed by the Minister for Planning will hold public hearings from Monday 27 October to enable community members to speak in support on their written submissions.

Council is now preparing its own submission informed by our community and in conjunction with neighbouring councils.

Council will host independent community information sessions to enable discussion, provide guidance on making a submission and answer questions.

Did you know that batteries should never be put in the bin. You can take them to a Council hub or transfer station.

Here are three things you should do with your used batteries:

- Put clear sticky tape over the ends to prevent them from touching (and causing a fire).
- Store them in an unsealed glass or plastic (not metal) container like a jam jar or ice cream tub, in a cool, dry place where kids and pets cannot access them.
- Take them to a nearby battery drop-off point as soon as you can.

Make sure to store the batteries safely before recycling them. Free mulch

Are you looking to give your garden some extra TLC? We have mulch ready and waiting for you at our transfer stations in Creswick, Daylesford and Trentham. It's free if you roll up your sleeves and load it by hand. If you need assistance loading, our trusty front loader machine at the Daylesford site is on standby for just a small charge of \$12 per cubic metre. The mulch comes from the green waste you all shared during our free disposal period in November. Your contributions are coming back to help your gardens grow.

It would take a very keen eye to have noticed any change at the Post Office in Creswick at the beginning of this month. The long-standing proprietor of the Creswick Licensed Post Office (LPO), Janine Booth, has officially retired and sold the business to her daughter Casey and husband Jason Preston.

After her mum purchased the LPO in 1998, Casey started working there on a casual basis. In 2003. after completing university studies, she continued parttime, as well as working short stints Buninyong, at Sebastopol and Ballarat West. When Janine was elected Councillor and then Mayor of Hepburn Shire Council, Casey took on more hours, in between caring for her four children, now aged 20, 14, 12 and nine.

In 2017, Casey took on the Manager's role, allowing her mum to semi-retire. After almost fifty years with the Post Office, Janine retired on 30 June, and the Prestons officially took over as owners on 1 July.

Casey does not foresee any changes to how the LPO will be run in the short to medium-term. A new computerised system was rolled out in March 2024, replacing 30-year old terminals. Changes hastened by the COVID pandemic, such as the surge in parcel deliveries, the drop-off in letters and the wider provision of banking services, are already well established.

Casey is most appreciative of the current staff at the LPO. There are two early sorters each day, plus three part-time workers in the retail area, which allows Casey to manage her family's work/life balance. She is a keen tennis player and committee member of the Mt Prospect District Tennis Association. Also the family has ties to the Creswick Soccer Club, where her two youngest sons are members.

Casey is very proud to live in Creswick. 'When we were young, all we wanted to do is leave Creswick, but now, having married a local and made our home and family here, I wouldn't want to live anywhere else.' Now, the small-town feel is exactly what she

Working with Ballarat City Council for a Better Gillies Road

Long Point Flora Reserve (LPFR) on Gillies/Ascot Roads is one of Creswick's hidden gold nuggets, as it consists of remnant vegetation from post-gold-rush but pre-agricultural clearing and gives a glimpse into the past. It's especially exciting in spring when the wildflowers and orchids bloom. Silver Banksia (Banksia marginata) and Black Sheoak (Allocasuarina littoralis) are also common in LPFR but not the general Creswick landscape due to clearing. The banksia is great for insects and nectar-loving birds, while the sheoak cones are a preferred food source of the yellow-tailed black cockatoos. Candlebark gums (Eucalyptus rubida) and Yellow Box (E. melliodora) are also found in LPFR.

City of Ballarat (CB) has provided funding for the rebuilding of Gillies Road, north from Ascot Road to Glendonald Road, with roadworks to start in a few months' time. However, earlier in June, the road was closed for preparatory work to clear vegetation. The Bald Hills Creswick Landcare Group Inc (BHCLG) has engaged positively with the council's team and their principal contractor, Fulton Hogan, to protect as much as possible in the area around Long Point Flora Reserve.

While four Candlebark gums needed to be removed and various wattles cleared, BHCLG ensured that the banksias and sheoaks and some significantly older Candlebark gums were protected. BHCLG had organised for the felled Candlebark gums to be repurposed into ground-storey habitat nearby, and the seeds collected from the branches before mulching, to give these trees a next life. While the seed was collected and sent to Seeding Victoria, the felled Candlebark gum logs sadly disappeared in the dark of night from the road shoulder. If there's any information on their whereabouts, we would love to know.

One retained Candlebark gum is quite old and is providing habitat for various birds and insects. On recommendation from the BHCLG, the CB has modified their road construction method to protect this massive tree. CB has indicated they may install a barrier to ensure safety for road users.

Once the road reconstruction is complete, BHCLG will be engaging with the council to improve roadside vegetation. BHCLG is interested to hear from residents and farms along Gillies Road about challenges arising from the local environment, for

example: wind, sun/shade, drainage/erosion, rabbits or other considerations. This input will assist in forming recommendations that BHCLG will submit to City of Ballarat. Please contact BHCLG by email on baldhillscreswicklandcare@gmail.com signalling your interest.

100 Years Ago

July 3, 1925

Since Mr. M. Martin, C.E., has taken over the works at North Creswick, formerly owned by the Creswick Brick, Tile and Potteries Ltd., he has been engaged in an endeavor to turn out a high-class earthenware pipe. The "burns" to date have been very satisfactory indeed, and it is stated the article produced is equal, if not superior, to any obtainable in the Commonwealth.

July 7, 1925

At the monthly meeting of the Creswick Havilah Lodge of Freemasons held on Saturday evening, Bro. Fred Bowley, S. W., was elected Master for the ensuing twelve months. He will be installed in the chair of King Solomon on Thursday, 30th July, after which a social will be held in the Town Hall.

July 10, 1925

Broomfield – A euchre tournament and dance is to be held in the State School this (Friday) evening, and promises enjoyment for all who attend. Valuable prizes will be give to the winners of the tournament, and supper is to be provided. The admission for the euchre is 1/- each and for the dance gentlemen will pay 1/- and ladies 6d.

July 14, 1925

Mr. W. B. Grose, representing the Country Fire Brigades' Board, has been appointed a member of the committee of the National War Memorial, a meeting of which will be held at the Melbourne town hall on Thursday.

Friday July, 17 1925

Hon W. F. Finlayson (Director of the Victorian Anti-Liquor League) will preach on Sunday, 19th July :- Victoria Street Methodist, 11 am; Scrub Hill Presbyterian, 2.30 pm; St. Andrew's Presbyterian, 7 pm.

July 21, 1925

Springmount – In connection with the Queen Carnival being held for the benefit of St. John's Church of England, Creswick, a euchre tournament and dance will take place at Springmount school next Friday evening, when the proceeds will be in aid of the Diggers' Queen. Good trophies will be given.

The admission is 1/1/2 d

July 24, 1925

Yesterday saw the entry into Port Phillip Bay of the largest fleet of war vessels that has ever visited Australia. It comprised 43 units of the United States Navy. The light cruiser Seattle, flagship of the fleet, carrying the flag of Admiral Coontz, entered the heads about 10 am., followed by the other light cruisers, the auxiliary vessels, and the destroyers, whilst the battleships followed later.

July 28, 1925

A "Cup and Saucer" social is to be held in the Salvation Army Hall on Thursday evening. The admission is by cup and saucer.

July 31, 1925

The annual reunion and social of former residents of Creswick and district, Geelong section, was held at the Central hall, Ryrie street, on Saturday last. There, to the number of 175, old friends from the district foregathered and a very happy time spent.


