A Gallery Committed to Celebrating Local Artists

In three short months, Creswick's Art on Albert has gained a reputation for providing an outlet for both professional and emerging artists, working in a range of diverse mediums.

On a regular basis, the displays in the gallery change to allow new works of art to be showcased and there is one area set aside for the works of children, which has proved very popular and entertaining.

Visitors to Creswick are delighted that a group of innovative locals banded together to develop the gallery, enhancing Creswick's reputation as a destination – not just an interesting small town to drive through on the way to Ballarat or Daylesford.

Of interest in the gallery this month are paintings by Chris Dobson, a trained teacher and artist; woodwork by Russell Cartledge which is enriched by careful use of coloured resin; linocuts by Colin Clark which are meticulously crafted – and of course many more works of art.

There's a fantastic display of ceramics from the Felix Ceramics Studio – a partnership between Belinda Michael and Jason Luca from Talbot. They have been working together for 11 years. Before that Jason was a chef, working in some very up market restaurants which he says isn't so very dissimilar to being a potter.

'As a chef I had to be aware of aspects of art, balancing colours, flavours, textures. Ceramics is not so very different! Belinda and I work together, sharing the roles in the studio. It's very much a collaborative effort – sometimes I throw and Belinda decorates, or vice versa.'

Jason says that he supports Art on Albert for this initiative as it is a great opportunity for local artists to present work to the general public without the commitment to exhibit in a regular type of gallery.

Art on Albert is extending it's lease for another six months to encourage local and regional artists to continue to support the gallery and its endeavours by exhibiting within the gallery.

National School Tree Planting Day

To celebrate *National School Tree Day* on Friday, 25 July, members of the Bald Hills Creswick Landcare Group joined year 5/6 students to plant a variety of Indigenous native grasses and shrubs in the school's courtyard.

The rejuvenation of the courtyard has been an ongoing project over the past 12 months. *School Tree Day* is one of Planet Ark's series of days during the year and is designed to inspire students to learn about their local environment while playing an active role.

The students were given a brief talk on what was to be planted and the benefits of encouraging native bees and other pollinators, to come into their garden. Plants included two types of tussock grass, Chocolate and Pale Vanilla Lilies, Tall Daisy and Trigger plants, with 77 planted in total. Each plant was given a feed of native plant food before planting and a water afterwards to assist in a higher survival rate.

Steve Hemphill from the Landcare Group was very impressed with the keenness of the students and their willingness to get a bit dirty. After the plantout, the school discussed continued involvement of the Landcare group and is looking at possible projects for next year.

Many thanks to the parent community and the Bald Hills Creswick Landcare Group for their support in getting the courtyard ready and leading the planting – it was very much appreciated.

Creswick Theatre Company

The New Ramp and Steps at Creswick Courthouse

Recent visitors to the Theatre will have seen the new access ramp and stairs at the front of the building. The marvellous steel handrail was made by Travis Smithard's dad from an old garden swing-set from the 1970s.

Now easier access to the building is made possible for all. At the recent *Twelve Minute Play Festival*, the first wheelchair users made their way up the ramp. Other improvements inside the foyer mean a wheelchair user, or less steady walker, can go up the ramp, straight through the foyer and into the theatre space all on the same level.

It is three years since these most recent improvements to the building began. The Courthouse building is owned by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA), which looks after public buildings, but is maintained by the Theatre Company. As you can imagine, looking after a classic Victorian gold-era building like this is a major undertaking.

In 2024, with a DEECA grant, damp prevention was undertaken and external brickwork repaired. Then planning commenced to ensure ongoing access for all members of our community.

The theatre's relationship with the Community Bank Creswick & District goes back a long way. The kitchen/green room installed at the back of the theatre was funded by a grant from the bank, and the new ramp was largely funded by them as well.

The idea of the structure is that the original building and steps can still be seen through the new ramp and the massive bluestone step blocks have not been

moved. Gestalt Engineering in Ballarat designed the structure. Plinius Engineering of Ballarat fabricated it and Masterson Builders of Ballarat and Mick Masterson completed the installation.

The Commitee also want to thank DEECA for their support and contribution to the funding campaign. Thanks also go to *CresFest*, who have always used the Theatre as a venue during the annual music festival and who made a contribution to this improvement.

Many have contributed to committee member Heather Ingram's fund-raising initiative to have named paver bricks to complete the landscaping. They will be installed soon.

The long-term hope is that the theatre, now one of a small number of old rural Victorian theatres with a well-equipped internal lighting and sound set-up, will, with this improved access for all, be able to establish itself as a venue for multiple uses.

Creswick Creek at Ring Road

The Bald Hills Creswick Landcare Group (BHCLG) was recently successful in receiving a Grant from the Hepburn Shire to work on the Creswick Creek at Ring Road. The Grant includes funding for weed removal and revegetating with 1600 indigenous wetland plants in jute mat. The plants will help to reduce erosion at times of heavy creek flows and improve water quality in the creek. Similar projects have occurred in nearby areas by other Landcare groups: you can see one at Ditchfield Reserve, Brown Hill (Wattle Flat Pootilla Landcare Group).

BHCLG will letterbox drop the streets around Ring Road/Creswick Creek to provide more information to nearby residents. Planting days are expected to be in May 2026. Further information will be published closer to the time. BHCLG thanks Hepburn Shire Council for their support with the project. 



100 Years Ago

August 4, 1925 Kangaroo Hills – a euchre tournament and dance will be held int he schoolroom tonight (Tuesday), in aid of the school funds. The admission is 1/6, the ladies providing refreshments. Good prizes will be given.

August 7, 1925 Springmount – To raise funds for the erection of anew fence at the Methodist Church, a grand fair is to be held in the Springmount State Schoolroom on Saturday (tomorrow) afternoon and evening. Novelties and competitions will provide enjoyment for all who attend. No charge for admission will be made in the afternoon, but in the evening 6d., is to be paid.

August 11, 1925 GOLF – The local links presented an animated appearance on Saturday afternoon, when over fifty members took out cards – several playing the first round of the knock out tournament. A 9 hole handicap was also competed for, the best card being handed in by R. Pasco. The sweepstakes was won by C. W. Frost. For the ladies, Miss Morris handed in the best card.

August 14, 1925 Nominations closed on Wednesday for the three seats in the Creswick Borough Council, rendered vacant through the retirement through

effluxion of time of Crs. W. P. Northcott, T. Cushing and E. J. Russell. The retiring councillors were the only ratepayers nominated, so an election will not be necessary.

August 18, 1925 NOTICE – R. Hodgson, of North Creswick, announces that he will attend the Ballarat Pig Market on Wednesday's. All Pigs entrusted to his care will be carefully handled and promptly delivered.

August 21, 1925 A meeting of all boys interested in the formation of a Scout Troup in Creswick is convened for this (Friday) evening, at 8 o'clock, outside Praetz's shop.

August 25, 1925 Present and intending members of the Creswick District Anglers' Club are requested to attend a meeting tomorrow (Wednesday) evening, at the office of the secretary (Mr. J. B. Mader) at 7 o'clock.

August 28, 1925 District residents will be interested in the success being attained by Mr. Christopher McRae, so of Mr. James McRae a native of Ascot, who was a former pupil at the Creswick Grammar School, and who now is the Chief Inspector of the Education Department of Victoria.









Kingston Friends of the Avenue

Kingston, Friends of the Avenue Inc. is seeking urgent support. It is hoped you will write a submission to the *Environmental Effects Statement* (EES) for the Western Renewable Links (WRL) Program, which will be delivered by AusNet. Submissions are due by 22 August, however, **The Friends have been granted an extension**.

AusNet proposes to use Kingston Road, which is home to the Avenue of Honour and Church Parade as heavy transport routes for the project. The EES Transport Technical Report refers to 75 trucks using Kingston Road, per day!

Please help us protect the Avenue from damage. AusNet is also proposing the removal of many trees in the district, including 63 critically endangered Yarra gums. Also of concern is the removal of habitat in the local nature reserve at the Bullarook Streamside Reserve, Werona-Kingston Road, on Birch's Creek. This includes removing the National Trust listed Algerian Oak and habitat for platypus.
