Local Students Awarded Prestigious YOUThrive Victoria Scholarships

Two local students, Jackie Rogers of Creswick and Olivia Kinnersley of Tourello, have been awarded 2026 YOUThrive Victoria scholarships, made possible through the support of Community Bank Creswick & District.

Selected from a competitive field of more than 300 applicants, both recipients demonstrated a strong commitment to building their futures while contributing to rural and regional communities.

Olivia has commenced a Bachelor of Medical Radiation Science in Diagnostic Radiology and has received a YOUThrive Victoria University Scholarship valued at \$30,000 over three years. Her goal is to improve access to medical services in regional areas.

Jackie has been awarded a Rural Chances Scholarship to support her Certificate III in Beauty. She hopes to one day own and operate her own salon in a rural community.

In addition to financial support, both students will benefit from YOUThrive Victoria's *Wrap-Around Care* program, which provides mentoring, leadership development and networking opportunities.

At John Curtin Aged Care (JCAC), purchasing by all departments is strictly controlled by its budgets. So, when new equipment needs are identified, in most cases, they will need to wait until the next budgeting round to be included, unless JCAC receives a generous donation for that purpose.

When approached by Judy Henderson on behalf of the Creswick Railway Workshop Association (CRWA), management was asked to consider what items could improve the efficiency of the kitchen. The Community Engagement Committee suggested they might identify a couple of pieces of equipment to give

CRWA a choice. The items identified were a return buffet toaster and a compact power mixer/blender, both being commercial standard items. Asked to fund either, CRWA say they would fund both. JCAC is extremely grateful for their generosity.

The CRWA Inc has a fund-raising opportunity shop known as Recycle Central, which is very well supported by the community. Volunteers Margie and Sandy and others work tirelessly every Saturday. All funds raised stay in the town to ensure the future sustainability of the Railway Workshops Project. In addition, the CRWA is able to return support to community organisations and individuals. When asked what they would like, JCAC described the need for two kitchen appliances that would improve food preparation and versatility for residents. Hence, the CRWA gave JCAC a donation of \$4,000.

JCAC would also like to remind the community that it is the largest employer in the district and is always looking to employ Personal care workers and engaging volunteers. Avenue visits



In 2023, Kingston Friends of the Avenue (FOA) joined Federation University's History and Heritage Partnership (HEP) network, coordinated by Professor David Waldron. The network connects third-year students with community organisations to undertake real-world projects. This provides opportunities for students to be introduced to, and involved in local history and history education.

In 2024, FOA proposed a project aimed at increasing community awareness of the Hepburn Shire's rich war heritage and encouraging greater engagement with its preservation. The concept centred on self-drive and online tours of local Avenues of Honour and war memorials.

FOA is delighted that four Information Technology students are now helping bring our vision to life, beginning with a virtual tour of the former Shire of Creswick Avenue of Honour at Kingston.

On 17 April, the students visited Kingston. The day began at the RSL Hall, where Phil Greenbank spoke about the Avenue's history and significance. The group then toured the Avenue before gathering at the Commercial Hotel for lunch and a visit to the Resource Centre to study the information that's available about the Avenue.

Once the virtual tour is completed, it will be accessible through the Kingston Avenue of Honour website: <https://kingstonavenueofhonour.org.au>.

FOA is grateful to the students for helping solve a long-standing challenge. For many years the Friends have asked how they could give families who can't visit their relative's tree in person a meaningful sense of



this remarkable place. The virtual tour provides that opportunity.

The essence of the Avenue's existence is to provide healing and solace for families and the community. For almost 110 years, the Avenue has offered remembrance, healing and a needs a strong sense of belonging for the community. It remains a dignified memorial to ordinary people who did extraordinary things. Through the virtual tour, families and the wider community will be able to experience and appreciate the significance and sanctity of this special place.

HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2024

Paul Ryzowy

29/6/1912 - 18/10/2008

Following WWII, as a refugee, Paul established Creswick Woollen Mills, giving employment to over 150 people, and promoted Creswick nationally.

Paul Ryzowy was born in Poland in 1912. In September 1939 Paul was a university student in Warsaw. At this time Jews were permitted to study law, but not medicine.

Warned of the imminent Nazi invasion, Paul fled with nothing but an overcoat. He was unable to farewell his parents, who perished in the Holocaust. Escaping to Russia with other refugees, he made his way to Japan via Vladivostok, then to Shanghai, China, latterly under Japanese control. Because he spoke Polish, Russian and German he was able to work as a trader and to earn some money.

Post-war, Labor Leader Arthur Calwell visited Shanghai and invited refugees there to come to Australia. Ryzowy went first to America, via Honolulu, to search for some

relatives. He stayed there until 1947 when he had little money left, then came to Australia, landing in Melbourne.

The Victorian Government of the time was encouraging decentralisation of industry from Melbourne to regional areas. Paul, with a friend from his Polish home town who had experience in the textile industry, borrowed £25,000 and purchased a property, previously used for a straw-thatching factory, in Creswick. He then imported some second-hand carding machines from England and commenced spinning wool.

The business grew and prospered. They not only spun wool but installed looms to manufacture fabrics. Quantities of grey blankets were produced and sold in the 1940s. In the 1950s they began making electric blankets which were marketed under the *Linda* trade-name along with fabric for fashion items. By the 1960s the mill was employing up to 150 people operating 50 looms. Over 10,000 of the blankets produced during this time were donated through the *Advertiser-Sunday Mail Foundation Blanket Appeal*, as well as through Ballarat's *3BA Winter Appeal*, to the poor and homeless.

Paul built a house in Williams Street, Creswick where he stayed during the week, returning to family in Melbourne at weekends. He also built houses for some of his employees, attracting skilled workers to the Mill.

In 1961, Paul went to London, carrying a letter of introduction from Premier Sir Henry Bolte. This opened many doors to assist with improving his products. In 1965 the Mill won an Australia-wide wool fashion award.

When the Government began tariff reductions the manufacturing industry faced increasing competition from overseas countries such as China. While many other mills ceased business, Paul was determined to adapt to change and for the mill to survive. He felt that local people should have jobs.

In 2004, the Mill gained a contract to design and produce a blanket for fire protection. Made from wool and steel, it is distributed to Victorian and interstate CFAs. The Mill also makes *Bluey* fabrics for jackets, the

only Mill in Australia to do so. The alpaca blanket is a luxury product developed in Creswick and, being both warm and light-weight, is very popular. Its label proudly proclaims

'Creswick'

80% alpaca, 20% Australian wool

MADE IN AUSTRALIA

The Mill exported speciality items, including the alpaca blankets to New Zealand, now they go to China, Japan, Russia and the USA.

At the age of 80, instead of retiring in comfort, Paul decided to build new premises in Creswick and invest in new infrastructures. He was determined that his precious Mill would keep up with changing technology.

Creswick Mill products are taken all over the world by visitors and tourists. The name *'Creswick'* is well known for this reason. The Mill is the largest private employer in our region and for this we must recognise the man who worked in it until he was 92, when he handed it to his grandchildren.

Paul Ryzowy died in Melbourne in 2008.

Draft 2026/27 Budget

Council has endorsed the release of the draft 2026/27 Budget for public exhibition. The 2026/27 Budget is community-focused and prioritises our Shire's needs while balancing external cost pressures with the community's capacity to pay.

Aligned with Financial Vision

Council's draft 2026/27 Budget has been developed in line with the adopted Financial Vision and Financial Plan 2025–2035. This budget is focused on long-term sustainability.

Financial health

Council has budgeted a minor operating surplus (\$511,000), with a positive unrestricted cash position. This is a positive trend and an improvement on prior financial years. There are no new borrowings and the Victorian Government rate cap of 2.75 per cent has been applied.

Capital works program

A \$10.5 million capital works program is planned, funded by Council funds, reserves and grants. The program prioritises asset renewal and current project completion over new assets. Funding includes \$2.8 million from grants and contributions. \$4.83 million will be spent on our local roads.

Investment in projects

There will be small investments in key projects next year to improve community engagement and customer service. Council will also review the Financial Plan 2025–2035 and alternative revenue sources.

Reduction in waste charge

The average waste charge will reduce from \$610 to \$540.

Cash managed responsibly

Council also has all its reserves 'cash backed' (available and on hand). This is positive financial management, and not something that is legislatively required.

The future

The draft 2026/27 Budget relies heavily on Council's own resourcing and limited revenue streams. A lack of support from state and federal governments over the last decade has meant councils are facing unreasonable cost pressures. Council will continue to monitor and review its financial performance.

What's next?

The draft Budget will be considered for adoption at a Special Meeting of Council on Tuesday 30 June.

100 Years Ago

June 1, 1926 Nominations close at 4 pm on Thursday for the vacancy in the Creswick Borough Council, caused by the demise of Cr. W. P. Northcott. So far the only candidate announced is Mr. W. Stanley Northcott, the eldest son the late member.

June 4, 1926 A meeting of the Trustees of the Creswick Cemetery was held on Tuesday evening. Arrangements were made for the planting of trees along the western boundary. The sexton was instructed to enforce the rules, requiring written application for permission to do certain works at the cemetery..

June 8, 1926 Mounted Constable G. J. Thorburn has resumed duty at Creswick after his holidays. He has been gazetted ranger for the borough to deal with the wandering stock nuisance. All owners of stock are warned that hereafter animals found wandering in the streets or roads unattended will be impounded.

June 11, 1926 Newlyn Cricket Club – Grand Premier Ball will be held in the Newlyn Hall on Wednesday night, June 16th, 1926. Jazz Orchestra. Supper. Double tickets 5/; extra lady, 1/. John T. Yates, President. H. Myles, secretary.

June 15, 1926 The monthly meeting of the Creswick Progress Association will be held tomorrow (Wednesday) night, at 8 o'clock in the bank chambers. There will be important business to transact, and it is hoped that the attendance will be large, ladies being especially invited to be present.

June 18, 1926 In connection with the 1st Creswick Girl Guides, a sale of gifts and concert will be held in the A.N.A. hall next Monday evening, and will be opened by Lady Peacock. The admission has been fixed at the small sum of 6d.

June 22, 1926 The annual meeting of the Creswick branch of the Red Cross Society will be held in the bank chambers tomorrow (Wednesday) afternoon at 3 o'clock.

June 25, 1926 The Old Creswickian Association in Melbourne having decided that another "Back to Creswick" be held early in November next, it will be necessary for the local residents to make arrangements for the fitting reception of the home-comers. For the purpose of considering the details, the Mayor (Cr. T. Cushing) has convened a public meeting of ladies and gentlemen for Monday evening next.

June 29, 1926 The annual meeting of the Creswick branch of the Australian Women's National League was held last Friday evening. In spite of the inclement weather, there was a very fair number of members present. The President (Lady Peacock) was in the chair.

165 years ago June 4, 1861 Rosekilly's Hotel – Miss Carry George and company performed at the Lyceum Theatre. This talented actress bids fair, under proper tuition to obtain an exalted position amongst theatrical celebrities – Mr. O'Connell will, on Thursday next resume the leadership of the quadrille party at the above named hotel. (This is the British Hotel, the Lyceum Theatre was where the old supermarket is now)

150 years ago June 2, 1876 Whilst searching some Chinese places at Black Lead yesterday morning, Sergeant Moran discovered several house-breaking implements in the hut of a well-known thief, named Ah Toy, consisting of a light crowbar, covered carefully with paper, a quantity of skeleton keys in a leather bag, and other things. The fellow was arrested for having those burglarous articles in his possession.

75 years ago June 1, 1951 Wandering cows cause damage to gardens and car. Wandering cows have been the cause of damage to gardens in Creswick this last week and to a motor vehicle on a country road in the shire. Two gardens at Camp Hill and one at Hammon street have been damaged. One householder reported 60 cabbages which were ready to cut were eaten or trampled....
